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A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

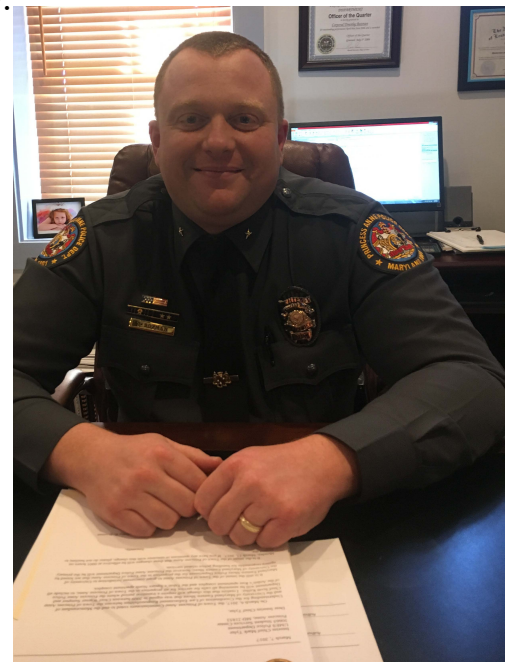

2018 ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

January: The Princess Anne Police Department participated in the local SKILLS competition held at the J.M. Tawes Technology & Career Center by sending a representative to be a judge for the criminal justice portion of the competition.



The Princess Anne Police Department became a certified agency with the ALICE training company on teaching civilians how to survive active shooting situations.

February: The Princess Anne Police Department participated in the Not My Child Presentations that were held at Washington High School. The presentations were designed to bring awareness to the opioid epidemic and how to get help.



March: The Princess Anne Police Department sponsored an Easter Egg Hunt for the students at Princess Anne Elementary School. Second grade students from Greenwood Elementary School also participated in the event.

Chief Bozman completed civilian active shooter classes for Landmark Insurance and Town of Princess Anne employees.

April: The Princess Anne Police Department was designated as the coordinating agency to conduct school security assessments for the Somerset County Board of Education. The assessments were conducted in April and May.



Chief Bozman attended the first annual Pinwheels planting ceremony at the Somerset County Circuit. The planting ceremony was designed to bring awareness to child abuse prevention.

The Princess Anne Police Department participated in the annual National Drug Take Back Day where citizens were able to safely dispose of unused or expired medications.



May: The Princess Anne Police Department began the hiring process for the newly created Cadet position by interviewing seniors at the J.M. Tawes Technology & Career Center.

The Princess Anne Police Department took a group of students from Greenwood Elementary School to the Discovery Center in Pocomoke under the PAPD Children's Safe Initiative.

June: Officers from the Princess Anne Police Department completed the DARE program to 5th grade students at Greenwood Elementary School and took the graduates to a graduation party at the athletic complex in Westover.





July: The Princess Anne Police Department participated in the Somerset County hurricane response table top exercise that was hosted by the Somerset County Emergency Services Office.

August: The Princess Anne Police Department hosted its annual National Night Out event at the Garland Hayward Youth Center.

The Princess Anne Police Department distributed school supplies to students at Greenwood and Princess Anne Elementary Schools.



September: The Princess Anne Police Department participated in the Somerset Rains Purple event that was held at the Somerset County Civic Center.

The Princess Anne Police Department completed civilian active shooter classes at the Princess Anne Library for and at the Department of Social Services.

October: The Princess Anne Police Department participated in the annual National Drug Take Back Day where citizens were able to safely dispose of unused or expired medications.

The Princess Anne Police Department co-hosted the First Annual Halloween Fest event.



November: Chief Bozman attended the ribbon cutting ceremony at Greenwood Elementary School for their new playground.

December: The Princess Anne Police Department participated in the Princess Anne Christmas parade.

The Princess Anne Police Department provided tours of the Grey Eagle during the Town of Princess Anne's historic tour.

The Princess Anne Police Department donated a used police vehicle to the J.M. Tawes Technology & Career Center's Criminal Justice class for training.

The Princess Anne Police Department co-sponsored the Winter Wonderland event at Greenwood Elementary School with the Maryland State Police and the Somerset County Local Management Board. The event provided vendors, food, and fun activities to families in the Princess Anne area.

PATROL DIVISION

The patrol division is the backbone of the Princess Anne Police Department. Ten out of the twelve sworn members of the police department are assigned to the patrol division. The patrol division provides 24 hour, 7 days a week patrol coverage in the Town of Princess Anne. The patrol division provides the initial response to calls for service along with initiating investigations to reported crime.

Officers that are assigned to the patrol division also have secondary assignments that ultimately supplements the goal of preventing crime. The Princess Anne Police Department has one K-9 who is certified in narcotics detection. The K-9 is available to other law enforcement agencies upon request. The police department also has two members who are certified in crash reconstruction. These officers respond to crashes involving a serious injury or a fatality and conducts the investigation.

The Princess Anne Police Department has two officers who are assigned to conduct school safety activities. These officers routinely conduct patrols at the two elementary schools that are located in the Town of Princess Anne. One of the officers is certified by the National Association of School Resource Officers and both officers are certified in teaching the D.A.R.E. program through the Maryland Police Training Commission. These officers work with students several times a week to develop positive relationships that will last a lifetime.

The Princess Anne Police Department has four members who are certified instructors through the Maryland Police Training Commission. These officers are able to provide training to the rest of the police department staff in order to meet police mandated training requirements. Training officers also have specialized instructor certifications in firearms, TASER, and crisis intervention. The police department also has five officers who are certified as field training officers who are responsible for field training new officers.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The criminal investigations division is comprised of two members. One of the investigators is assigned to a patrol squad and is responsible for investigating all serious crime that is reported. The second investigator is assigned to complete administrative duties with oversight of the division. The main purpose of the division is investigating all serious crime that is reported to the police department.

The officers that are assigned to this division are trained in interview and interrogation techniques along with statement analysis. One of the officers is a certified Computer Voice Stress Analysis operator. All members are trained in crime scene investigation and are responsible for processing crime scenes. The criminal investigations division is also responsible for maintaining the police department's evidence control room.

SUPPORT SERVICES

The Princess Anne Police Department has one civilian employee that is responsible for support services. Support services consist of answering telephone calls, dispatching officers to calls for service during daytime hours, filing reports, entering payroll, completing warrants and criminal summons entries, completing the department's NCIC entries, and completing monthly UCR reports. Our civilian also assists the Chief of Police with preparing reports and financial matters.

The Princess Anne Police Department implemented a Cadet program where two seniors were hired after graduating high school. The Cadets are assigned to assist with support services along with beginning pre-law enforcement training.

AWARDS



Officer of the Quarter-1st Quarter: Detective Sue Dize was awarded the Officer of the Quarter for the 1st quarter of 2018. Detective Dize was one of the top producing officers for the quarter as she handled 161 calls for service while completing 50 follow up investigations. Detective Dize was also assigned two major cases during the quarter. Detective Dize was assigned a domestic violence case that involved the suspect firing shots at the victim on March 9, 2018. Detective Dize was able to locate the suspect and recovered a firearm. Detective Dize was also assigned a stabbing case that involved three victims on March 10, 2018. Detective Dize conducted an investigation and was able to identify the suspect and placed charges against the suspect.



Officer of the Quarter-2nd Quarter: Corporal Rondell Redding was awarded the Officer of the Quarter for the 2nd quarter of 2018. Corporal Redding was the top producing officer for this quarter as he handled 75 calls for service, completed 4 criminal arrests, completed 4 DUI arrests, and cited 500 motor vehicle violations by either warning, citation, or repair order. Corporal Redding also completed 215 property/business checks and completed 22 incident reports.



Officer of the Quarter-3rd Quarter: Detective Sue Dize was awarded the Officer of the Quarter for the 3rd quarter of 2018. Detective Dize was one of the top producing officers for this quarter as she handled 142 calls for service while completing 23 follow up investigations. Detective Dize also was assigned an attempted armed robbery investigation that occurred at the Karemore Pharmacy on August 13, 2018. Detective Dize was able to charge three suspects in that case. Detective Dize was also assigned two other armed robberies during the quarter and was able to close one case while the other remains under investigation. Detective Dize was also tasked with investigating two serious child abuse cases.



Officer of the Quarter-4th Quarter: Corporal Rondell Redding was awarded the Officer of the Quarter for the 4th quarter of 2018. Corporal Redding was the top producing officer for this quarter as he handled 69 calls for service, completed 9 criminal arrests, completed 1 DUI arrest, and cited 396 motor vehicle violations by either warning, citation, or repair order. Corporal Redding also completed 219 property/business checks and completed 30 incident reports.

Commendation: Sergeant Scott Carew was awarded a Commendation award for his extraordinary intelligence, coverage, and ability in effecting an arrest in a domestic violence case. On January 31, 2018 officers responded to a unit on Pine Knoll Drive and learned that the suspect had assaulted the victim and subsequently stole the victim's vehicle. Sergeant Carew observed the suspect traveling north on Route 13 in the victim's vehicle and followed it into Salisbury before being able to stop the vehicle. The suspect fled on foot from the vehicle; however, Sergeant Carew was able to apprehend the suspect and also recovered a firearm that belonged to the suspect out of the vehicle.



Bronze Star: Corporal Rondell Redding was awarded a Bronze Star award for displaying exceptionally meritorious service to the department and to the community and for an act involving personal danger under aggravated or hostile circumstances. On March 2, 2018, Corporal Redding heard a radio broadcast in regards to a vehicle that was suspected as being involved in an attempted armed robbery in Salisbury. Corporal Redding later observed the vehicle traveling south on Route 13 and was able to conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle. As a result of the stop, a loaded handgun was recovered along with the suspects of the attempted armed robbery being arrested and charged.



ADAPT Award: Corporal Rondell Redding received the ADAPT (Aggressive Drivers Are Public Threats) award for being the top officer from the Princess Anne Police Department in enforcing aggressive driver violations in 2018.

MADD Award: Corporal Rondell Redding received the Mothers Against Drunk Driving award for being the top officer from the Princess Anne Police Department for enforcing alcohol related violations in 2017 and 2018.

PROMOTIONS



Officer First Class Kara Meeks and Officer Rondell Redding were promoted to the rank of Corporal on February 5, 2018. The rank of Corporal is a first line supervisor position and is responsible for supervision of patrol officers that are assigned under the Corporal's patrol group.



NEW OFFICERS

Officer Corey Somoskey joined the Princess Anne Police Department on December 10, 2018. Officer Somoskey has ten years of law enforcement experience and was previously certified as a police officer with the Plymouth Police Department in Connecticut. Officer Somoskey recently moved to the Eastern Shore to be closer with family. Officer Somoskey will be completing his Maryland Comparative and Compliance certification training in the early part of 2019.

RETIREMENTS

K-9 Inka retired from the Princess Anne Police Department on December 31, 2018. K-9 Inka and her handler, Sergeant Scott Carew served together for 9 years. K-9 Inka was certified in the detection of narcotics to include marijuana, cocaine, heroin, methamphetamine, and ecstasy.





TRAINING

All sworn police officers are required to qualify with their weapons at least once each calendar year along with completing judgmental scenarios. Additionally, all officers must complete a minimum of 18 hours in-service training each year. All of the sworn officers have completed the required training for the calendar year of 2018. Most officers complete more than the 18 hours of in-service training along with our civilian staff who are not required to complete in-service training. The additional hours of training helps to maintain the highest standards for all of our employees, and provide the most complete array of services for our community. GRANTS

CMCA Block Grant: In February of 2018, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$2,000.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Local Management Board under the Communities Mobilizing for Change on Alcohol program. The grant ended June 30, 2018 and was intended to provide additional officers on patrol during peak party time hours where alcohol violations would be occurring. Officers working the grant were able to enforce 21 motor vehicle violations.

Gun Violence Reduction Initiative: In July of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$8,000.00. This grant was funded through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention and the grant ended on June 30, 2018. In July of 2018, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$5,000.00 that will end on June 30, 2019. The grant provides overtime for officers to conduct extra patrols for the purpose of identifying persons who commit gun related crime and to seize illegal firearms. The grant also provides funding for investigators to follow up on reported gun related crimes. Officers that worked this grant during the calendar year of 2018 were able to seize 6 firearms, conducted 7-gun related arrests, and conducted 10 interviews in gun related cases.

Highway Safety Grant: In October of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$8,502.50. This grant was funded through the Maryland Highway Safety Office and the grant ended on September 30, 2018. In October of 2018, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$7,494.85 that will end on September 30, 2019. The grant provides overtime for officers to conduct extra patrols to identify motor vehicle violations such as driving under the influence of alcohol, aggressive driving violations, distracted driving violations, seat belt violations, pedestrian violations, and bicycle violations. Officers that worked the grant waves during the calendar year of 2018 were able to issue 503 citations, 668 warnings, 33 equipment repair orders, and completed 7 DUI arrests.

PAPD Children's Safe Initiative: In July of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$15,000.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Local Management Board and ended on June 30, 2018. This was the third year the police department was fortunate enough to have received this grant which allows officers to conduct extra patrols at Greenwood and Princess Anne Elementary Schools in order to develop positive relationships with the students. The grant also provided funding to support the D.A.R.E. program along with helping to support trips for students to the Discovery Center, WBOC radio/tv stations, and a Delmarva Shorebirds game. The grant also supported community initiatives such as National Night Out and the Annual Spring Easter Egg Hunt. Sadly, this grant was not renewed in July of 2018, due to the funding program being discontinued at the Governor's Office of Children. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2018 were able to complete 164 hours of patrol coverage to the elementary schools, completed 3 outreach events, instructed 78 students in the D.A.R.E. program, and completed 153 positive contacts with students.

Safeguarding Children Grant: In July of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$5,870.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Local Management Board and ended on June 30, 2018. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct follow ups with children of arrested parents. The cases that were followed up on were for any case that a PAPD officer made an arrest and for cases where a parent was arrested in a domestic violence situation. The follow ups allowed officers to make sure that there were appropriate resources in place to assist children. In July of 2018, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$5,870.00 that will end on June 30, 2019.

School Bus Safety Enforcement Fund: In July of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$10,000.00. This grant was funded through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention and ended on June 30, 2018. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct extra patrols during the hours when school buses were operating. Officers enforced motor vehicle violations for passing school buses when flashing red lights were on along with other violations that were observed in areas where students were being picked up or dropped off. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2018 were able to issue 1 citation for actual school bus violations, 27 citations for other violations, completed 64 hours of patrol, and followed 48 school buses through the Town of Princess Anne. The grant was not renewed in July of 2018 as the program was discontinued through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention.

Maryland Substance Abuse Prevention Block Grant: In July of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$2,000.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Health Department and ended on June 30, 2018. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct compliance checks on stores that sell alcohol products. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2018 issued 2 civil citations to employees of businesses who provided alcohol to underage people. In July of 2018, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$2,000.00 that will end on June 30, 2019.

SYNAR Grant: In July of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$3,000.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Health Department and ended on June 30, 2018. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct compliance checks on stores that sell tobacco products along with conducting surveillance on those stores. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2018 issued no citations which indicated all of the businesses were in compliance. In July of 2018, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$3,500.00 that will end on June 30, 2019.

Cigarette Restitution Fund Community Prevention Grant: In September of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$1,500.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Health Department and ended on June 30, 2018. The grant provided overtime for officers to teach tobacco prevention education to all 3rd grade students at Greenwood Elementary School. In October of 2018, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$1,500.00 that will end on June 30, 2019.

Opioid Intervention Team Grant (SCOUT): In October of 2017, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$5,000.00 with an additional award of \$2,000.00 in May of 2018. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Health Department under the Somerset County Opioid Unified Team. The grant provides overtime for our K-9 officer to maintain training certification in detection of opioids along with providing overtime for officers to work joint agency initiatives that target illegal narcotics activity especially opioids. This grant will end on June 30, 2018. The Princess Anne Police Department was awarded \$5,000.00 in July of 2018 which will end in June of 2019.

TECHNOLOGY / UPGRADES / UPDATES

TASERS: The Princess Anne Police Department continued to upgrade its TASER technology in 2018. The upgrades started in 2015 with the purchase of a X2 TASER, the purchase of two X2 TASERS in 2016, the purchase of one X2 TASER in 2017, and the purchase of four X2 TASER in 2018. The X2 model replaces the aging X26 models and the police department will be using these units over the course of a five-year lease. The X2 models contain new smart technology which is capable of maintaining the safest amount of contact as possible with an offender. The X2 models also allow an officer to engage two threats at the same time unlike the X26 model which only allowed one threat to be engaged at a time. The X26 models are not manufactured anymore and the police department will continue to phase the X26 models out over the course of the next two years.

Mobile Data Terminals: The Princess Anne Police Department obtained two Panasonic G1 tablets in 2018. These tablets were included in vehicle purchase leases and the G1 model has a built-in scanner and camera. These units are more versatile in the field as the officer is able to take the tablets out of the vehicle on motor vehicle crashes and criminal investigations. The G1 model is also capable of being taken out of the vehicle and functioning as a desktop computer at headquarters which will ultimately eliminate the cost of replacing desktop computers and software licenses. The police department plans to complete the transition to the G1 tablets in 2019.
