Our officers worked very hard in 2016 as they responded to 5,562 incidents in 2016. This number set a new record for the highest number of incidents for a single year. Despite the negative trend in reported crime, our officers were able to close 83 percent of the reported crime in 2016. Our officers were able to do this with hard work in our community to solve problems. We increased the number of community initiatives we participated in and made tremendous strides in developing positive relationships with our youth.

In 2016, we continued to improve the operations of the police department by increasing our shift staffing and investing in the latest technology to help improve public safety in Princess Anne. Our efforts alone cannot achieve our overall goal of making Princess Anne a safe place to work and live. We are thankful for the help of our business owners and residents that share our vision and work hand in hand with us.

I would like to close by thanking the men and women of the police department for their commitment and dedication to Princess Anne. We have a highly-trained group of officers who are committed to public safety in Princess Anne. I am extremely proud of them and I promise that we will continue to provide a high level of service in 2017.

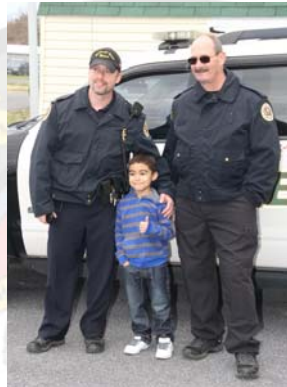

2016 ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

PATROL DIVISION

The patrol division is the backbone of the Princess Anne Police Department. Ten out of the twelve sworn members of the police department are assigned to the patrol division. The patrol division provides 24 hour, 7 days a week patrol coverage in the Town of Princess Anne. The patrol division provides the initial response to calls for service along with initiating investigations to reported crime.

Officers that are assigned to the patrol division also have secondary assignments that ultimately supplements the goal of preventing crime. The Princess Anne Police Department has one k-9 who is certified in narcotics detection. The k-9 is available to other law enforcement agencies upon request. The police department also has two members who are certified in crash reconstruction. These officers respond to crashes involving a serious injury or a fatality and conducts the investigation.

The Princess Anne Police Department has two officers who are assigned to conduct school safety activities. These officers routinely conduct patrols at the two elementary schools that are located in the Town of Princess Anne. One of the officers is certified by the National Association of School Resource Officers and both officers are certified in teaching the D.A.R.E. program through the Maryland Police Training Commission. These officers work with students several times a week to develop positive relationships that will last a lifetime.

The Princess Anne Police Department has three members who are certified instructors through the Maryland Police Training Commission. These officers are able to provide training to the rest of the police department staff in order to meet police mandated training requirements. Training officers also have specialized instructor certifications in firearms, TASER, and crisis intervention. The police department also has five officers who are certified as field training officers who are responsible for field training new officers.

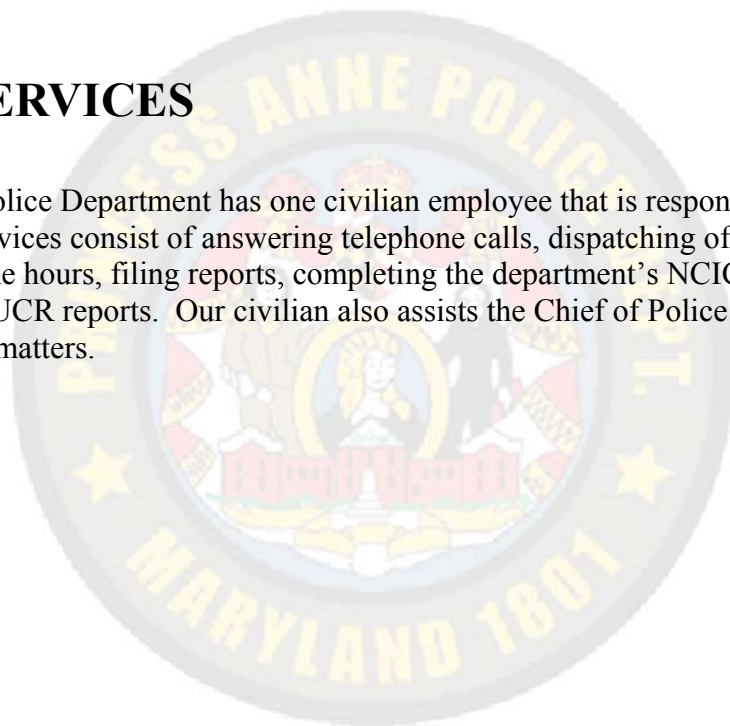
CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The criminal investigations division is comprised of three members. Two of the members are assigned to a patrol squad and are responsible for investigating all serious crime that is reported while the respective squad is working. The third member is assigned to administrative duties with oversight of the division. The main purpose of the division is investigating all serious crime that is reported to the police department.

The officers that are assigned to this division are trained in interview and interrogation techniques along with statement analysis. One of the officers is a certified Computer Voice Stress Analysis operator. All members are trained in crime scene investigation and are responsible for processing crime scenes. The criminal investigations division is also responsible for maintaining the police department's evidence control room.

SUPPORT SERVICES

The Princess Anne Police Department has one civilian employee that is responsible for support services. Support services consist of answering telephone calls, dispatching officers to calls for service during daytime hours, filing reports, completing the department's NCIC entries, and completing monthly UCR reports. Our civilian also assists the Chief of Police with preparing reports and financial matters.



Life Saving Award: Sergeant Scott Carew was awarded a Life Saving award for administering Narcan three times from February 17, 2017 to March 22, 2017. Sergeant Carew responded to three separate locations during this time frame and administered Narcan to three subjects who were suffering from an opioid overdose. The use of Narcan was able to help all three subjects regain consciousness and survive the overdoses.

Life Saving Award: Officer Sue Dize was awarded a Life Saving award for administering Narcan to an unresponsive subject on May 25, 2016. Officer Dize responded to the McDonald's restaurant in reference to a subject who was unresponsive in one of the bathrooms. Officer Dize recognized that the subject was suffering from an opioid overdose and administered Narcan which allowed the subject to regain consciousness. The subject was transported to PRMC and survived the overdose.



Bronze Star Award: Lieutenant Robert Wink and Officer Rondell Redding were awarded a Bronze Star for arresting a subject on September 22, 2016 who had shot a firearm at a subject in the Manokin River Park. Officer Redding located the suspect, who was still armed, walking along Somerset Avenue. Officer Redding attempted to place the suspect under arrest, however the suspect resisted. Lieutenant Wink arrived and assisted Officer Redding with placing the suspect under arrest with no injuries to the officers or the suspect.



Smooth Operator Award: Officer Rondell Redding received a Smooth Operator award from the Maryland Highway Safety Office as Officer Redding was the top officer from the Princess Anne Police Department in enforcing aggressive driving violations.



MADD Award: Sergeant Scott Carew received the Mothers Against Drunk Driving award for being the top officer from the Princess Anne Police Department for enforcing alcohol related violations in 2015 and 2016.

TRAINING

All sworn police officers are required to qualify with their weapons at least once each calendar year along with completing judgmental scenarios. Additionally, all officers must complete a minimum of 18 hours in-service training each year. All of the sworn officers have or will complete the required training for the calendar year 2016. Most officers complete more than the 18 hours of in-service training along with our civilian staff who is not required to complete in-service training. The additional hours of training helps to maintain the highest standards for all of our employees, and provide the most complete array of services for our community. 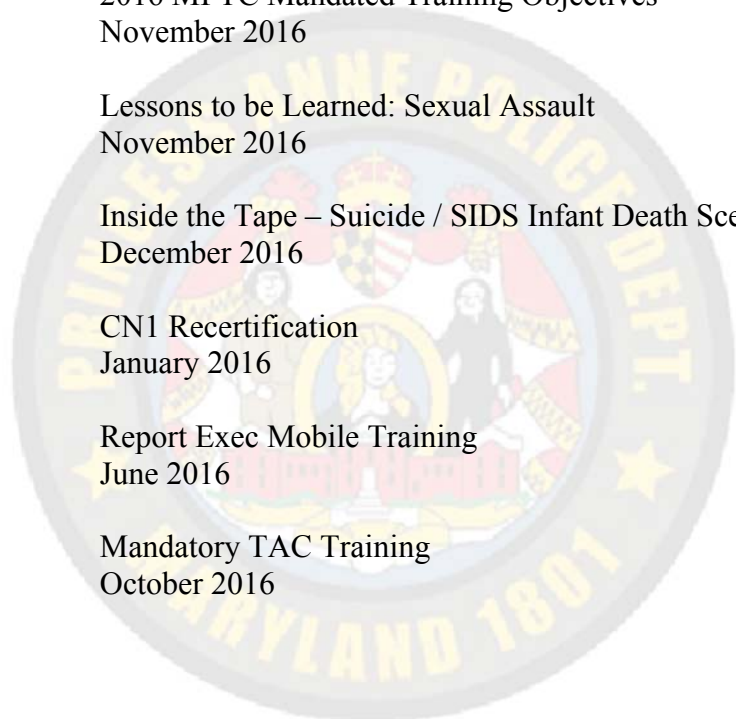

Grants

Collaborative Anti-Gang Enforcement & Strategies (CAGES): In October of 2015, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$31,000.00. This grant was funded through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention and was managed by the Somerset County Local Management Board. The grant ended in December of 2016. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct extra patrols in designated areas that were experiencing gang related crime. The patrols were joint agency patrols with the Maryland State Police Princess Anne Barrack, the Somerset County Sheriff's Office, and the Crisfield Police Department. The grant also provided funding for the purchase of equipment to assist with combating criminal gang activity. The officers that worked this grant were able to complete 2 gang related arrests, seized one firearm, completed 9 adult criminal arrests, completed 5 juvenile criminal arrests, issued 36 motor vehicle citations, issued 84 motor vehicle warnings, and completed 39 field interview reports. The Princess Anne Police Department was able to purchase a new video server and two pole cameras. This project was completed in 2016.

Gun Violence Reduction Initiative: In July of 2015, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$6,000.00. This grant was funded through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention and the grant ended on June 30, 2016. In July of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$6,000.00 that will end on June 30, 2017. The grant provides overtime for officers to conduct extra patrols for the purpose of identifying persons who commit gun related crime and to seize illegal firearms. The grant also provides funding for investigators to follow up on reported gun related crimes. Officers that worked this grant during the calendar year of 2016 were able to seize 3 firearms, conducted 4 gun related arrests, and conducted 19 interviews in gun related cases.

Highway Safety Grant: In October of 2015, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$10,000.00. This grant was funded through the Maryland Highway Safety Office and the grant ended on September 30, 2016. In October of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$ that will end on September 30, 2017. The grant provides overtime for officers to conduct extra patrols to identify motor vehicle violations such as driving under the influence of alcohol, aggressive driving violations, distracted driving violations, and seatbelt violations. The grant also provides funding to purchase equipment related to traffic safety. Officers that worked the grant during the calendar year of 2016 were able to initiate 196 vehicle contacts, issue 98 citations, 199 warnings, and completed 2 arrests. The Princess Anne Police Department was also able to purchase 3 LIDAR units, 4 traffic safety warning signs, and 5 traffic safety cones.

Law Enforcement Training Scholarship (LETS) Grant: In October of 2016, The Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$820.00. This grant was funded through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention and ended on November 30, 2016. This grant allowed an officer to attend a specialized interview and interrogation class by the John E. Reid & Associates, Inc.

PAPD Children's Safe Initiative: In July of 2015, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$15,000.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Local Management Board and ended on June 30, 2016. This was the first time the police department applied for this type of grant which allows officers to conduct extra patrols at Greenwood and Princess Anne Elementary Schools in order to develop positive relationships with the students. The grant also provided funding to support the D.A.R.E. program along with helping to support trips for students to the Discovery Center, WBOC radio/tv stations, and a Delmarva Shorebirds game. The grant also supported community initiatives such as National Night Out and the 1st Annual Spring Easter Egg Hunt. In July of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$15,000.00 that will end on June 30, 2017. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2016 were able to complete 214 hours of patrol coverage to the elementary schools, completed 10 outreach events, instructed 130 students in the D.A.R.E. program, and completed 331 contacts with students.

Safeguarding Children Grant: In January of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$6,000.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Local Management Board and ended on June 30, 2016. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct follow ups with children of arrested parents. The cases that were followed up on were for any case that a PAPD officer made an arrest and for cases where a parent was arrested in a domestic violence situation. The follow ups allowed officers to make sure that there were appropriate resources in place to assist children. In July of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$5,500.00 that will end on June 30, 2017.

School Bus Safety Enforcement Fund: In July of 2015, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$8,677.00. This grant was funded through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention and ended on June 30, 2016. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct extra patrols during the hours when school buses were operating. Officers enforced motor vehicle violations for passing school buses when flashing red lights were on along with other violations that were observed in areas where students were being picked up or dropped off. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2016 were able to issue 4 citations for actual school bus violations, 65 citations for other violations, 72 warnings for other violations, and followed 354 school buses through the Town of Princess Anne. In July of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$8,700.00 that will end on June 30, 2017.

Maryland Substance Abuse Prevention Block Grant: In July of 2015, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$1,500.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Health Department and ended on June 30, 2016. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct compliance checks on stores that sell alcohol products. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2016 were able to issue three citations to stores for selling alcohol products to people under the age of 21. In July of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$2,000.00 that will end on June 30, 2017.

SYNAR Grant: In July of 2015, the Princess Anne Police Department was awarded a grant in the amount of \$1,500.00 and later in the year an additional \$2,500.00. This grant was funded through the Somerset County Health Department and ended on June 30, 2016. The grant provided overtime for officers to conduct compliance checks on stores that sell tobacco products along with conducting surveillance on those stores. Officers that worked the grant in calendar year 2016 were able to issue two citations to stores for selling tobacco products to minors under the age of 18 along with completing one criminal arrest for shoplifting. In July of 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department received a new award for \$2,200.00 that will end on June 30, 2017.

Technology / Upgrades / Updates

Body Cameras: In 2016, the Princess Anne Police Department renewed its contract with TASER international and upgraded the department's body camera technology. The police department obtained 9 Axon Flex 2 body cameras that will be paid for over the course of a five-year lease. The contract covers video storage and the actual cameras. The Axon Flex 2 cameras replace the Axon Flex cameras that were initially obtained in 2013. The Axon Flex 2 cameras are self-contained units that provides the benefit of not having to replace wires, batteries, and other accessories that were necessary with the Axon Flex models. The Axon Flex 2 cameras are easier to use for the officer and are also safer for use in the field.

TASERS: The Princess Anne Police Department continued to upgrade its TASER technology in 2016. The upgrades started in 2015 with the purchase of a X2 TASER and with the purchase of two X2 TASERS in 2016. The X2 model replaces the aging X26 models and the police department will be using these units over the course of a five-year lease. The X2 models contain new smart technology which is capable of maintaining the safest amount of contact as possible with an offender. The X2 models also allow an officer to engage two threats at the same time unlike the X26 model which only allowed one threat to be engaged at a time. The X26 models are not manufactured anymore and the police department will continue to phase the X26 models out over the course of the next two to three years.

Mobile Data Terminals: The Princess Anne Police Department obtained two Panasonic G1 tablets in 2016. These tablets were included in vehicle purchase leases and the G1 model has a built-in scanner and camera. These units are more versatile in the field as the officer is able to take the tablets out of the vehicle on motor vehicle crashes and criminal investigations. The G1 model is also capable of being taken out of the vehicle and functioning as a desktop computer at headquarters which will ultimately eliminate the cost of replacing desktop computers and software licenses. The police department plans to obtain additional G1 tablets over the course of the next two to three years.

Pole Camera Project: The Princess Anne Police Department was able to obtain two new pole cameras through grant funding which was added to the departments network. (A new camera server was purchased in 2015). The network now has three locations feeding through it which does not include the in-house cameras at PAPD. This project is scheduled to expand in 2017.

Headquarters Upgrade: A new security system was installed at headquarters. The new security system features the use of key fobs instead of the aging combination lock code system on the exterior doors. The system is capable of being monitored by Bay Country Security. The police department is planning to expand this project over the course of the next two to three years to include interior doors such as the evidence control room and quartermasters room.

Policy Manual: The Princess Anne Police Department contracted with Funk and Bolten Law Firm to assist with the revision of the department's policy and procedure manual. Approximately a quarter of the manual was updated in the first year and this work will continue over the next couple of years.
